Dear Chair Joyce and Ranking Member Cuellar:

As you develop the fiscal year 2024 (FY24) Homeland Security Appropriations bill, we write to request that you include \$30 million in the U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) Operations and Support (O&S) account for Handheld Trace Level Fentanyl Detection Devices.

This funding would provide for the procurement and deployment of up to 300 additional handheld mass spectrometry trace level chemical detection devices for use at ports of entry, including airports, seaports, border crossings, international mail facilities and laboratories throughout the country. These devices are capable of detecting the presence of even the smallest amount of fentanyl in substances seized by CBP and other federal agencies.

CBP plays a critical role in stemming the flow of fentanyl and other synthetic opioids into the United States, and the success of their efforts depends on their officers having a sufficient supply of the best available technology. Handheld trace level detection devices are an important complement to other technologies, such as bulk detectors, and provide a high level of protection for those officers who are made immediately aware of the presence of the deadly substance. Onsite detection of synthetic opioids using these devices also allows for the detention of individuals attempting to bring illegal substances into the United States and assists CBP laboratories by alerting them to substances that should be prioritized for further analysis.

Pursuant to the INTERDICT Act (PL 115-112), Congress has appropriated significant funding for CBP to increase the number of chemical screening devices available to identify fentanyl and other synthetic opioids. Some of these funds have allowed CBP to purchase, test and deploy 120 handheld mass spectrometry devices which are capable of detecting trace levels of substances like fentanyl and synthetic opioids as low as 1% purity. Additional units are needed at other CBP locations and we request that you include \$30 million in your FY24 bill to provide for the purchase and deployment of an additional 300 high pressure mass spectrometry devices to meet that need.
